
6. General Store Co-op Hare Krishna vegetarian All-You-Can-Eat lunch

The opening ceremony is set for July 27, 2012, and the games are to last until August 12, 2012. Because the Olympic games have greatly evolved very much from when they were first initiated, it is easy to forget the origin of the games. The games began in the year 776 BC as a part of a religious festival held in honor of Zeus atop Mt. Olympus with only the 600 foot long foot race being featured as an event. Just as today's Olympic games have grown to include a variety of different sports, so too did the original Olympic games. Over time, the games grew to include boxing, wrestling, long jump, and even a footrace called the hoplitodrome in which the participants had to complete a foot race decked out in full armor. At first, the contestants of these games were all male and were all from some part of the Grecian empire, but as the games continued, males from different parts of the Roman Empire were allowed to participate. Instead of referees and playback technology, the athletes who participated in the games took an oath that they would abide by all the rules. Unfortunately, once the Roman Empire conquered Greece, the Olympic games declined and were completely gone by 393 AD. Then, with the help of Baron Pierre de Coubertin, the International Olympic Committee was founded in 1894 which helped bring back the greatness of the games. Because of Coubertin's efforts, the first Olympic games since the ancient times was held in 1896 where it all began: Athens, Greece.

These towering creations can often be seen from across the festival grounds and act as additional magical elements to this already fantastical festival. Some previously displayed pieces have been a pair of giant, functioning Tesla coils that light up the night sky with magnificent electricity light shows. This year there was a giant, steel flame-throwing lobster that was both comical and intimidating. For multiple years now, there have been gigantic flower figures varying in design and material, that always managing to exude elegance and bring a softer side to the festival contrasting the blistering heat. 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UCSD Changes Class Enrollment System for Fall 2012 By: Austin Bacong

College students around the nation know what it is like to register for classes. As expressed by an internet meme, a seemingly simple task that literally takes a couple of minutes after preparation through the Class Planner found on TritonLink can feel like a warzone, where you don't know if you'll make it out

alive. As crude as this simile is, it is the perfect comparison to my first experience registering for classes as a first year. Well, maybe not *so* extreme, but very on point! I count myself as one of the lucky ones; the credits from all the AP classes I took during high school paid off with a Sophomore/almost Junior standing. But with the competition of upperclassmen who have amassed more units, students with grants, scholars, tour guides, and athletes that got first priority, registering for classes was still a difficult process. I'll never forget "camping out" at my computer, minutes before my enrollment time. I had accurate knowledge of the spots left for a G.E Area of Focus requirement, the course

codes already written down in the priority order I needed to register in. As soon as my appointment time hit, I frantically entered WebReg. I rushed to put the Section ID in literally during the first minute of access, only to be denied the specific class time I wanted, and with the waitlist already having grown five deep in a matter of seconds, I was forced to move to one of several other alternative plans I created, resulting in the dreaded and controversial 8am time slot.

It is with the experiences like mine and several other students that I feel have influenced the University to adopt the new Class Enrollment System. A campus wide notification via email was sent out February of the 2012 Winter Quarter. Called the "Two-Pass Enrollment", undergraduate class registration as of May 9, 2012 (beginning Fall 2012) will be divided into two passes, with notification of separate enrollment times for each pass. During the First Pass, students will only be allowed to enroll up to 11.5 units, with no waitlists available. According to the Registrar, "This gives all undergraduates a better chance to obtain at least two classes toward fulfilling requirements. Waitlists will not be available during the first pass to encourage students to select required courses." If you miss your First Pass registration time, you must wait for the Second Pass. For the Second Pass, students are allowed to register up to 19.5 units (waitlists now available) and 22 units on the first day of classes (which is the same standard as our current system). Other miscellaneous benefits to this new pass system include full funding to financial aid recipients of at least 12 units, Saturday enrollment times, and enrollment times from 7am-11pm Monday-Friday. Students with any questions regarding the Enrollment System change are free to contact the Office of the Registrar.

Although a drastic change from the current system of class registration, other UCs such as Cal, LA, and Davis already have the system in use. The change is designed to make it easier for undergrads to register for at least a couple classes per quarter that are often hard to get into because of limited availability.

While it may be somewhat demoralizing for upperclassmen who have toiled away over the years to get better positions on WebReg through their amassed units, the Two-Pass Enrollment system's intent is to help students obtain classes that are often difficult to get into, allowing for a more even spread of undergraduate completion of required courses.


